DISCLAIMER
The rules of the reserve are intended to apply only to: 1) property currently owned or later acquired by reserve managers, including the Bureau of Land Management, State of Utah Division of Parks and Recreation, State of Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, Washington County, St. George City, and Ivins City; and 2) other properties for which access agreements have been negotiated within the boundaries of the reserve. Use of all other property within the reserve requires compliance with generally applicable law, including, where applicable, permission from the landowner. This plan is not intended to imply that permission has been granted for use of any property not owned by the reserve managers.

WARNING
The lands within the reserve are wild and rugged and pose a variety of dangerous conditions, including but not limited to steep cliffs, uncertain terrain, loose rocks, flash floods, lightning storms, lack of available water, extremes of heat and cold, and wild animals, such as mountain lions. Using the reserve may involve substantial risk of injury or death. All those who enter upon and use these lands do so at their own risk and are cautioned to avoid all uses which pose a significant risk of harm and any uses for which they are not adequately trained, equipped and otherwise prepared.

RESPECT WILDLIFE. View animals from a distance to avoid disturbing them. Tortoises are well known to the area and are protected by law. Generations to discover and enjoy the area are dependent on your actions.

UPLAND AND LOWLAND ZONES. Within the reserve there are a variety of habitats, ranging from lower elevation Mojave desert communities to piñon-juniper woodlands. The reserve is designated as a wilderness study area, where the terrain permits, or they may utilize the designated trails within the zone. Camping and campfires are also allowed, with some limitations, in the Upland Zone.
